Mentoring Builds Leaders

Have you ever been mentored by someone? All Toastmasters should answer "YES" to this question, because that's what Toastmasters is all about. We mentor each other in our club every day, as we evaluate how our fellow Toastmasters are progressing in their speaking and leadership roles.

The word "mentor" originated in Homer's epic poem *The Odyssey*. When Odysseus, King of Ithaca, went to fight in the Trojan War, he entrusted the care of his son, Telemachus, to a wise old friend and teacher, Mentor. Now the word "mentor" is defined as a trusted confidant, guide, tutor, or coach.

Why Get a Mentor?

People improve themselves by taking on new challenges in their lives. Eleanor Roosevelt emphasized this quite well when she said, "You gain strength, courage, and confidence by every experience in which you stop to look fear in the face... you must do the thing you think you cannot do."

But sometimes we need a little help moving forward to attain our goals. That's when we can benefit from the wisdom and experience of our fellow Toastmasters to guide us. This enables us to get help and resources, experience encouragement, build our confidence, and develop contacts with our Toastmasters network.

A mentor guides us to develop ourselves and regain our focus. As Albert Schweitzer stated, "At times our own light goes out and is rekindled by a spark from another person. Each of us has cause to think with deep gratitude of those who have lighted the flame within us." All Toastmasters should be thankful for every mentor who has touched their lives.

Why Be a mentor?

Those of us who have been in Toastmasters for a while have developed many skills, and let's admit it, we like to share that knowledge with others.

Becoming a mentor for your fellow Toastmasters

allows you to pass on your wisdom.



One of the latter steps in developing our skills in Toastmasters is learning how to help others become competent communicators and leaders. They say that the best way to learn something is to teach it, and that's what a mentor does.

A mentor acts as a role model, coach and confidante, and gives knowledge, wisdom and perspective to the mentee. Harvey Firestone nicely explains the importance of mentoring when he said "The growth and development of people is the highest calling of leadership."

D6 Mentor Program Mission

District 6 has developed a formal program to allow Toastmasters all over District 6 to connect with one another to form mentor-mentee relationships. This is an opportunity to get very specific mentoring from persons in the district that you may not have had an opportunity to connect with previously. I encourage all Saturday Morning Live! members to consider sharing their expertise with others by signing up to be a mentor, and if there is a specific area you could use some help with, consider becoming a mentee as well!

Qualities of a Mentor

To be an effective mentor, you must be:

- Available. Spend at least 15 minutes a week helping with speech assignments, answering questions, and reviewing meeting roles. During the first few weeks most new members may require more time.
- Patient. People learn at different speeds, and some need more guidance than others.

• **Sensitive.** Tact and diplomacy are vital. Some people join Toastmasters to overcome shyness or fear of speaking. As a mentor, always keep comments motivating and encouraging.

- Respectful. Each person is unique. Respect your mentee's wishes and don't push too hard.
- Flexible. Life happens. Always remember that not everything goes according to plan, and you may have to allow for last-minute changes.
- Supportive. Show pride in your club and what it has done for you. Be an advocate for the Toastmasters program.
- Knowledgeable. Before becoming a mentor you must have completed at least five speeches in the basic

- manual, served in most meeting roles, developed enough speaking skills to help another member, and become familiar with your club's routines as well as the Toastmasters education program.
- **Confident.** A mentor should come across as self-assured and friendly, eager to help.
- **Listening.** By being a good listener, you enable the mentee to articulate any problem and sort things out.
- Concerned. You must truly want to help others.
